Alice, myself, Julie Jeaman + Carl Hays visited several clubs in Bishop.

Man told us of William Finlay who used to teach clog dancing at Fatfield - a village which he said no longer existed. He used to have a troupe called 'Billy Finlay's Troupe' who danced at local village concerts. They danced on wooden clog mats 'because it made a better sound' - they danced on the spot & to gramophone records. They often danced to 'Swanee River' & to an unremembered hymn. There were competitions in local cinemas at which winner decided by volume of clapping. Some of his mates learnt from WF - this would be ~~c. 1920's~~ 1920's. Some of his pupils were:-

He thought they now lived 'by the old church up at Hennington (?Honington)'.

At the same club (Barley Mow.) we met Fred Foster. who lived 4 doors down from the club on the R. Apart from the capper dance he had learnt to clog from a Mr Banyman at the age of 17. 'just the basics'.

Carl met a woman who had heard of a champion from Ashington called Mrs Cowie - she owns a shop there. She used to dance at Balbirnie + had lots of medals for dancing + had done tours abroad.

At the Couston Social Club we met a woman who said that people used to dance at Beamish on a Sat night in the pub + that there were competitions in the cinemas on Sat nights. She had heard of a Mr Hoyle (not Wanen Doyle)

A Mr Charlie Searle had a brother in Gateshead who had 'taught himself clog-hopping' - sounded like he just used to make it up.

A woman had learnt to clog dance from her father John Suter of Birtley. She said that her sister had also learnt & was a better dancer.
