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Mrs Birbeck, 28 Oaks Road, Great Green, nr Leicaster, aged 59

Mrs Bubeck is the daughter of Richard Allan of Langwath by [cf. English Notes, p. 12 262. She has some memories of his actusties as a darring-teacher, but not very dear ones - understandably, since she left home at 15.

Richard Allan lived at Langwathby all his life, and by trade was a railway worker. He died not long before 1945, at the age of 83.

From at least 1910 (a probably much earlier) up to at least 1915 (when this Birbeck left home) Richard Allan held a combined class and dance every Saturday night throughout the winter (from October to the end of March) in the Ascembly Rooms, Langwathby. Mus Burbeck attended These from the age of 10 until she left house. The Assembly Rooms at Langwattby were the name of the local hall, a single-starcy structure. The classes were advertised on a board in the yard of the Assembly Rooms.

Each evening was divided into two pasts, a class for children from about 8.30, followed by a dance for adults for about 8.30 a 9. Mr 7 or 7.30 to Allan charged 3d a night for the children, and 6d or more for the adalts. There were usually about 20 children, and something like 40 adults; they would have sometimes 4 sets of hancers on the floor, with people sitting out as well. Perhaps Twice during the writer he would have a big dance - these were always well attended. So far as she knews, he had no classes exercisered, though he was sometimes asked to play at dances outside Langwattiby.

At Langwatthey, he taught the children proper steps in his classes. He demonstrated the steps first, then played & made the children try them.

The dances which he taught were

So far as the Bestelle knows, Richard Allan did not Teach step-dancing. At any rate, the names of the Westmanland steps were unfamiliar to her. Indeed, she has never seen any step-dancing either in Langwatthey, or lates in Appleby.

She is not sure whether he langht the elignette of the ballroom, but in any case the proper eliquette was observed. For a O dance, they promenaded with their partners until the time struck up; in other dances they went straight to their places. The children had flat shoes", the adults ordinary shoes, not patent lealter. ble did not teach The adults.

Min Bibeck does not know who taught her father to dance ; she has never heard of Bobby Miller.
