## Miss Addie Robinson, Crake Terrace, Penny Bridge, Greenodd, N. Lanes, c. 55.

In pursuit of the programme, we visited Miss Robinson the following evening after our visit to Miss Roberta Robinson. Miss Robinson very landly allowed us to borrow it, together with a photograph of he grand father.

Mini Robinson's grandfatter was Robert Casson Robinson, the R.C. Robinson mentioned on the programme. He was born in 1833 m' the same house as herself in Penny Bridge, and died at the age of 55 m' 1888. Her great-grandfatter was the highway surveyor for the district, and he used to take RCR with him to carry the chain's, etc., and the boy get became so hearthy sick of their that he took up doncing instead. It would seem that RCR was a full-time teacher, at least in his early years, for an Miss Robinson's father's burth certificate in 1866 RCR gave his profession as Trofession of Dancing. When RCR got on in years, he may have had a part-time job as a rate-collector — this was Miss Robinson's father's profession.

Mini Robinion's fatter died in 1957 at the age of SI, and most of her himololedge of RCR is derived from him, though she has met people in her younger days who attended his classes, at Milloin, and near Barrons. RCR was a fiddle, but did not teach the violin. We had classes as for away as Croothwate, for her fatter in later years he had a weak heart, and her father used to walk to Croothwate with him to make sure that nothing happened to him. According to her fatter, his classes lasted a quoster. Bother her fatter and her uncle learnt the local step-dancing from RCR, and her fatter also learnt Horse to Newmarket from him [it is not mentioned on the programme]. Ider fatter did Horse to Newmarket at a ball, with another boy, and used to tell Mini Robinson about This, how "the two whips sounded as one". She has never heard her feither mention the names of the local stops.

According to her father, RCR studied dancing in London, but Miss Robinson does

not know when This took place.

Musi Robinson has her family tree for many generations back, and she can state quite definitely that R.C.R. was definitely not related to old Jos Robinson of Lakeside (note that old Jos. was only 5 years younger than RCR).

Miss' Robinson has heard of the schools closing for the dancing-master, but does not know whether this ever took place for her grandfather.
