May I thank you both very much indeed for you hospitatity last month. I thoroughly enjoyed all my visit to the islad, and I am most grateful for all you help in my research.

Since I kept you, I have discovered a little more about The Robinson's family, though I still haven't solved the problem of where old Jos. leant his damaning. On the way home from my last stay with you I visited Alf R's damphe near Burnley, and last. Thesday I managed a one-day misit to hancaster & More cambe to see other members of the family.

In brief, I discovered that all of Jos's children are now dead. He had nine in all, Stainton, Margaret. Matthew, John, Catherine, Mary, Joseph, Robert, Albert. Of these, Matthew and Mary died at the ages of 5 and 4 respectively; all the rest manned, and had children.

Stainton married a Jane Smith, and, as you know, only two of his children are alwe, you mother and Mrs Pickethall.

Margavet manned a Tommy Stainton, and two of Their children are alive in hancastes. I have seen the daughter, and I doubt if her brother, who is 5 years younger, would add anything to what the daughter has told me.

John had the boarts at Bowness, and there are some children above.

Catternie (Kate) played the plano of helped her father at brothers in the dancing classes. She and the manned a Mr Booth, and died in 1942. A son and two daughters are still alwe; I have the address of the son and will write to him, and will also ask him for his sisters' addresses.

Joseph had the carting contract for the blue mill at Backbarrow. We had two children both of whom I have seen, Mrs Clark at how wood, and Joseph Robinson, the portman at Finsthwaite.

Robert drone a landam on Monecombe prom; he has one doughter still alwe, somewhere in The Manchester area, and no-one seems to know her address.

Albert (Alf) had a son and three doughters, but one of the daughters is now dead." I have seen the other three children. ((though some may be wrong))

The story of Jos as I have obtained it so far in that his parents died when he was about 14 or 15, and that he became a bobbain Turner at The old mill at Cunsey. He remained at the bobbain mill until at least around 1880, and may eventually have been in charge of it. The bobbai mill was then damaged by fine, and he left and settled at habeside, where he remained until his death.

When he died, the family heirbooms (i.e. the family bible, a photograph or two, and the caps he wan for exhibiting the sheepdag in the photo you have and for bird fameying) passed to the eldest surviving child, transport (this Stainton). When she died, in 1915, they passed to her daughter, who gave them to AIG. On Alfis death, in 1958, they remained with his children. I have seen the family bilder, but it starts and form old Jos, and Tells us nothing of his forbears. The caps are in the hands of the husband of Alfis daughter who died, and I will visit hum in the near future.

I now have the exact date of old Jos's wedding, and when I have cleared up all the other quene;, I will write to Somerset House to see if I can get anything there.

This must be all for the moment. When I have all the bose ends trahed up, I will let you have the full story, with determent such attended other information as I have.
