COMPÈRE

This year we welcome back Ronald Smedley as our compère for the day. Ron joined the EFDSS in 1947 and was a full time member of staff from 1951-1955, when he joined the BBC. He served on the Society's National Executive Committee, was Chairman of its Artistic Development Committee and was director of London Folk, the Society's principal display group, for seventeen years. He directed several of the Royal Albert Hall festivals between 1961 and 1977. He was visiting teacher for English Folk Dance at the Royal Ballet School from 1969-1989 and helped to form the Royal Ballet Company's Morris side, the Bow Street Rappers. He was awarded the Society's Gold Badge in 1999.

The talk will cover informants such as Alex Woodcock, Ivy Sands, Mrs Marhoff, Elsie Willis and will be illustrated with video clips, photographs and, it is hoped, live demonstrations.

To wind up the day we have a Barn Dance with music from The Rakes and caller Hugh Rippon. Hugh draws upon many years experience and a very wide repertoire to select the right mix of fun and skill that makes for a really enjoyable evening. WHOLE DAY WORKSHOPS

This year we are also holding a workshop aimed specifically at young people and their teachers to give them a flavour of two contrasting styles of dance. The Rapper Sword workshop with High Spen is open to dancers of all abilities.

The grading of the other workshops follows our usual system. In order of challenge they are Beginner - Improver - Intermediate - Advanced. These should be interpreted with regard to your experience in the respective tradition. Those with no previous dance experience may have difficulty keeping up with beginners, whilst those proficient in related forms of dance may find the pace slow and possibly advanced easy. The Workshops are arranged in order of difficulty, 3 being easiest and 9 the most advanced.

1 HIGH SPEN BLUE DIAMONDS RAPPER SWORD DANCE All Abilities HARD SOLED SHOES

In their workshop High Spen will be teaching their First or Exhibition dance. They will cover the basic shuffle and break step with variations on the break. They will also teach the figures of the dance from the easier to the more difficult including the "bulldog". High Spen will welcome dancers of all levels of ability and will be able to teach in groups to ensure everyone obtains the maximum benefit and enjoyment. The High Spen Blue Diamonds are a traditional rapper sword dance team from the pit-village of High Spen in the North East. They began as a boys team in 1926, taught by Fred Forster, his grandson Ricky is now in charge.

DAY OF WORKSHOPS FOR YOUNG PEOPLE & TEACHERS

BOB PARKER TEACHING OF THE SAILORS HORNPIPE HARD SHOPS WITH HEEL

The workshop will be based on a film used for teaching young ratings on "HMS Ganges" - a training ship of the Royal Navy which no longer exists. The workshop will be for young people and teachers to learn the steps and explore choreography for performance. Bob began dancing at the age of eight. He joined the EFDSS in 1947. After National Service he taught Movement and Dance and later became a College Lecturer in teacher education following a year at the Art of Movement Studio under the leadership of Lisa Ullman. For twenty years he was a visiting teacher in English Folk Dance at the Royal Ballet School and visited New York to work with the School of American Ballet. He is a founder member of the Beaux of London City Morris Men and of London Folk. Please wear trousers for this workshop, the Musician will be Ben Thackeray, melodeon, lead musician with Reading Cloggies.

ALEX FISHER RAPPER SWORD DANCE HARD SOLED FOOTWEAR

This introductory workshop, as well as being great fun, will emphasise teamwork and timing. No previous experience is required though it is hoped that something will emerge for the workshop showcase!?

A dancer and teacher by profession, Alex is based in county Durham, the home of rapper sword dancing, and has danced with many teams including Short Circuit Rapper and Newcastle Cloggies. Now working in a freelance capacity, she teaches rapper and clog for Folkworks - the Folk Arts agency in Newcastle, working with school and adult groups throughout the North. Alex draws much of her inspiration for rapper dancing from the energy and precision of High Spen Blue Diamonds.

3. JOHN WALFORD LAKELAND CLOG Absolute Beginner & Beginner

CLOGS OR HARD SOLED SHOES

This year John will teach a number of easy Lakeland clog steps from Tom & Joan Flett's book "Traditional Step Dancing in Lakeland" to provide a routine for those completely new to clog dancing. The steps will also be used in a three hand reel. The pace will be for beginners and aspects of performance will also be discussed. The musician will be Paul Earwicker melodeon.

4. JENNIFER MILLEST LIVERPOOL HORNPIPE AND CUMBERLAND SWORD DANCE

Improver/Intermediate HARD OR SOFT SOLED SHOES WITH HEELS

Two interesting dances noted in the 1950s by Tom Flett, who passed them on to Jennifer in 1975. This Liverpool Hornpipe (5 steps) is from William Adamson, who taught dancing in East Fife until 1953. His

father learnt it from a dancing teacher in Wester Fife about 1875. It is different for the Liverpool Hornpipe from Wigtonshire (taught by Jane Lloyd in 1990) but has similar features to Adamson's Clog Hornpipe (taught by Ian Dunmur in 1990 and 1996). Those attending should be familiar with a straight shuffle, catch in, treble shuffle and back treble, but a reminder of these will be given at the beginning of the workshop. The Cumberland Sword Dance (4 steps) is from Tommy Cannon, who taught dancing in Lakeland from about 1910 to 1925. A version of this dance was performed at last year's Festival by the Allenova Dance School, to whom Jennifer had taught it at their Summer School. The main requirement for this dance is to be able to hop about for 2 minutes! Swords will be provided for the workshop. The musician will be Frank Lee melodeon.

5. PAT TRACEY OLD LANCASHIRE HEEL & TOE ROUTINE B Improver/Intermediate CLOGS

Pat's workshop is designed primarily for dancers with some knowledge of Old Lancashire Heel and Toe (e.g. have learnt Routine A). The class will start with a revision of the basic steps. The B routine is an expansion of the widely performed A (or beginners) routine. It incorporates some familiar steps, some traditional variations on familiar steps and some new and more complicated steps. It makes a showy dance. Attention will focus on style, technique and presentation. The aim is to have a worthwhile dance to take home. Accompanying practice videos will be available at the Festival. The musician for Pat's workshop will be John Dickson.

6 GRAHAM & MARY COLE DURHAM CLOG HORNPIPE Improver/Intermediate CLOGS

Graham and Mary will teach a variety of Durham Hompipe steps concentratir leading to a performance sequence. The pace of the workshop will start r depending on the abilities of the participants. Graham and Mary have been more than thirty years. They have taught and performed at Festivals in El CANCELLED taught clog for fifteen years at Cecil Sharp House and is currently teaches En Royal Ballet School. The musician will be Alec Hitchcock, fiddler of Reading (for replacement see insert



7 CAROL LOUGHLIN WELSH CLOG STEP Intermediate CLOGS

As one of the leading professional clog dancers in South Wales, Carol Loughlin has been studying the traditions and techniques of Welsh clog stepping for a number of years, and has taken Welsh clog into Europe and the USA.

This workshop is suitable for people who have done some Welsh clog previously, or people proficient in other step dance styles. If you haven't tried Welsh clog stepping before you may be in for a little culture shock! Forget those English shuffles, and a step in Welsh clog rarely lasts for more than a bar!! The tradition for Welsh clog is not to be taught a "set dance". Instead, the component steps are learnt and dancers are then encouraged to develop their own style and devise their own routines. However, as workshop time is limited, you may find that the components will fall naturally into a routine of their own! The musician for this workshop will be Andy Johnson, piano.

8. PENNY & ANTHONY ALLEN APPALACHIAN CLOGGING ROUTINE

Intermediate/Advanced HARD SHOES OR TAPS

Penny is the founder and dance director of Broken Ankles and both she and Anthony are well known teachers and innovators in the tradition. Rather than teaching a 'steps-only' routine, the emphasis here will be on the fluidity and movement characteristic of the modern Appalachian form. This workshop will incorporate steps/moves/choreography/basic dance and performance techniques. The morning session will teach the step sequences required for the routine, together with style and some practice techniques. The elements will be built into a full piece, which could further be used as a framework for participants' own routines. Ankles' regular workshop and performance fiddler, Linda Came, will provide the music.

9. PETER CLIFTON JIG STEPS FROM SAM SHERRY Advanced CLOGS

Peter learned to dance with RT&SDG in the early 1970's. After learning a basic technique principally from Mike Cherry, he met Sam Sherry at a workshop. The workshop sessions were followed up by individual tuition from Sam. Having first learned the 'Exhibition' routine, the 'Jig' steps soon became a particular favourite. Much time has been spent trying to capture the particular style of the steps. From a simple basis the steps develop into a complex and fascinating routine with a variety of finishes to complement each step. The workshop, which was taught by Peter in 1996, will be taken at an advanced pace and will be backed up by a set of notes for later study. Ian Dunmur melodeon will be the musician.

10. JACK BROTHWELL MUSICIANS WORKSHOP

We have asked Jack back after the highly successful workshop he ran last year. He will use his many years' experience as bandleader and professional musician to offer another fine selection of tunes and arrangements geared to folk instruments together with some work on less used rhythms. There will be emphasis on ensemble playing and the role of the band in helping the dancer. The workshop will be suitable for a wide ability range so the content will, to an extent, be dictated by the skills of the participants. but at least a basic competence is expected. It is not suitable for complete beginners.

GEOFF HUGHES "WOODLAND FLOWERS" ROUTINE

Intermediate/Advanced CLOGS

Geoff Hughes, author of "Clog Steps for Beginners", learnt his first clog steps in 1965 from an ex-pupil of Johnson Ellwood. Several years later he was invited by Johnson to visit him to learn several of his family's steps. In the early 1970's Geoff met Mrs Marhoff when she was living in Cambridgeshire, was auditioned by her and deemed worthy of learning her dances! He visited her many times to learn her dances and these visits greatly influenced his dancing.

Geoff's dances are a mixture of traditional steps as well as many of his own creation and his style shows its north-eastern influences. He will be teaching his own 5-step "Woodland Flowers" routine which involves a lot of "kicks and rolls" and back-heel work so some previous experience of these movements would be advantageous.

WORKSHOPS

We limit the number of dancers in each workshop according to the style of dance and the size of the room. LOCATION


The School is located 1½ miles west of Maidenhead railway station and ¼ mile south of the A4. The Map Reference for Altwood School is SU867804.
