## 24th Clog and Step Dance Festival

Welcome to our 24th Festival in yet another location. Our planning has been delayed this year due to having to find a new venue just before Easter. We investigated over 30 locations in and around Reading and few were able to meet our requirements for small rooms without carpet. Most of the suitable locations were already booked so we have two venues this year instead of one. All the day time activities will be in the Meadway Campus and the Barn Dance will be held at Prospect College. The schools are only a mile from each other so transferring to another location for the dance won't be a problem for you. Due to the need to change venues, we have decided not to have a lecture this year. The Group has had to work extra hard this year to provide a successful festival and we very much hope that you will enjoy it as before.

## Workshop Notes

In order to save time during the workshops we ask Tutors to provide notes for you to take away after the Festival to help you to remember the Fiddlin' dance you have learned.

## Compère

We again welcome Brian Jones, one of 'our own'! Brian came to study at the University of Reading in 1965 and never left the town. He first ioined RT&SDG in 1970s and his first clog performance was on Sidmouth arena as the hind legs of a cow (Geoff Hughes being the front legs). Brian subsequently danced English, Scottish, Morris and Mummed at Sidmouth and eventually became Arena Director. He is sometime Chairman of The English Folk Dance and Song Society and Folk Dance caller of events from Playford Balls to Ceilidhs. He is a dance composer but with a strong love for traditional dance.

## Festival Barn Dance Around with caller Rhodri

Davies

This year we have put together a truly winning combination of a fantastic band and a brilliantly capable caller.

Since hitting the folk world in 1998 this dynamic team of Brian Stone and Bob Tracy on fiddles, Malcolm Cole on quitar and Andrew King on bass have attracted a huge following for their exhilarating mix of Jazz, Irish, American, Cape Breton, French Canadian and a wide range of other musical influences. They deliver a rare amalgamation of sparkling virtuoso playing and totally dance orientated rhythm. They have a full round of Festival bookings so we were fortunate to be able to book them.

Caller Rhodri Davies is a bright light on the folk dance scene being equally at home with the Contra or Ceilidh. He draws from a huge repertoire and always hits just the right note for the dancers. He has a great following at festivals so we are indeed lucky to have tempted him down from Manchester although he did not need much persuading to work with such a sought-after band.

## Workshops

The Morris lias workshop is open to dancers of all abilities. The grading of the other dance workshops follows our usual system. In order of challenge: Beginner - Improver - Intermediate - Advanced. These should be interpreted with regard to your

experience in the respective tradition. If you have never danced before you may have difficulty keeping up with the beginners' workshops. The workshops are arranged in order of difficulty, 2 being easiest and 7 the most advanced.

#### 1. MIKE GARLAND

#### Morris Jigs

HARD SOLED SHOES

Mike is past Baaman and Squire of the Morris Ring, and past Baaman and Squire and currently Foreman of East Suffolk Morris Men and has been running very well received instructionals for clubs and festivals for many years. He is a fine dancer and teacher and has an extensive repertoire.

He proposes to start with the Fieldtown dances but a major accent of the workshop will be on the art of dancing a jia. Depending on the experience of the group he will move on to other traditions and intends to provide everyone with something that they can take back and use with their clubs. He may be assisted by his son Adam. The Musician will be Jon Melville playing Accordion and Concertina.

#### 2. KATHRYN TATTERSALL

Pat Tracey's Beginners Waltz

Absolute and Utter Beginners

CLOGS or HARD SOLED SHOES This dance was designed by Pat Tracey to introduce people to the Lancashire cloq waltz. It covers steps and movements typical of that style, and forms a basis for more advanced stepping in the waltz rhythm. The workshop gims to enable you to get the feel of the waltz rhythm, express it in your dancing, learn a performable eight step routine and gain enough

confidence to perform it in public. Kathryn will be assisted by two members of Camden Cloa.

3. SIMON HARMER Moving Feet **Beginners** HARD SOLED SHOES Jo and Simon Harmer met through Clog Dancing and have been dancing together for over 20 years. Their interest in step dancing expanded first into Appalachian and then into other forms of step dance from across the Atlantic. After a visit to Cape Breton Jo developed an interest in that style as well as steps from other areas of eastern Canada. Simon has recently been working with Alex Boydell learning his method of improvising clog steps from simple base step motifs. Both Jo and Simon have had wide experience in teaching steps to beginners as well as experienced dancers.

Whatever style of step dance you learn there is a common movement vocabulary although the language used to describe it might vary. In the Learn to Step Dance workshop the building blocks of steps will be taught in reel time. Emphasis will be placed on rhythm, transference of weight and posture. The base steps will be combined to form an interesting routine for practice or to perform. Wear comfortable smooth soled shoes (not clogs). If you've always longed to step dance without knowing where to start, this workshop is for you! The musician will be lo Harmer.

#### 4. DAVID JAMES

Blackbird

ALTERNATIVELY COMFORTABLE LEATHER SOLED SHOES. (NOTHING WITH ANKLE RESTRAINT NOR TRAINERS) David James runs a School for adult dancers at the Irish Centre, Reading. David has been dancing since he was a child and has held the title of All England Champion and Britain and Ireland Champion. Together with Linda Heneghan – known to many of those who attend the Festival - he has danced at countless folk festivals in Europe and the UK including the Royal Albert Hall.

David's steps can be traced back to the beginning of the last century having been taught by Tony O'Sullivan a pupil of the legendary Ted Cavanagh. The Blackbird, which David will be teaching, is a beautiful traditional Irish Hornpipe and is the foundation of many other Hornpipe Set Dances





If you are an experienced dancer but have decided to try a different style you may need to join a workshop at an easier level. We limit the number of dancers in each workshop according to the style of dance and the size of the room. Places will be allocated in order of bookings received so we ask you to give alternatives in case your first choice is fully booked. If you find that you cannot cope with the workshop booked, please tell the workshop steward and then go to the Reception Desk. They will try to fit you into an appropriate workshop, but transfer to another workshop must depend on space being available and the Tutor being able to accommodate someone who has missed part of the tuition.
