STAN HUGILL


Stan Hugill served in sailing and steam ships for a period of twenty-six years, was twice shipwrecked and is one of the surviving seamen to have rounded the Horn in a squarerigger in midwinter.

He was the shantyman aboard the 'Garthpool', and is without doubt the leading authority on sailors' work songs in Britain.

He has written three books, 'Sailortown', 'Shanties from the Seven Seas' and 'Shanties and Sailors Songs', and was the Bos'n and instructor at the Outward Bound School in Aberdovey.

We are privileged to have him as one of our advisers on the item 'The Noble Captain' in the first half of the programme.

LONDON FOLK

London Folk is the name now used by the dancers who every year provide the backbone of the Festival—in previous years they have been billed as The Festival Dancers or The London Corps. Although they meet regularly for rehearsal in London, the dancers come from no less than fourteen different counties, including some as far away as Northampton and Somerset.

Admission is by audition at an annual party, and additional dancers of Festival standard are welcomed.

As well as taking part in this annual festival, the London Folk also dance at other events throughout the year, both in Britain and abroad.
